Ken Elkinson has known his share of traffic jams. He lived in New York and Atlanta before moving to Los Angeles, so the pianist has experienced some of the most monumentally screwed-up traffic in North America.

So Elkinson, whose compositions lean toward the elegant and ambient, wrote an entire boxed set called "Music for Commuting." It's designed to bring calm into the lives of drivers prone to road rage, a group he joined long ago.

Elkinson started work on "Music for Commuting" after driving "in three of the worst traffic cities in America. It was also the fact that I am a super angry driver, and I needed something to keep me calm on the roads," he wrote in an email. "The tipping point was that I did not want to get my 4-year-old twins shot in some road rage incident."

"The powers that be decided to shut down a ridiculously busy stretch of the I-405 Highway here in Los Angeles for construction for 53 straight hours starting on July 16," Elkinson wrote.
